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

In an effort to uphold health and safety best practices surrounding the COVID pandemic, STEP Head Start is not currently brushing teeth when children are in their care. However, there is an imperative need to still support dental hygiene!

STEP Head Start Health Specialist, Buffy Neese, ordered and sorted individual take home dental kits for all pre-enrolled and enrolled children in the Head Start program. With the assistance of education and support staff, approximately 430 dental kits were distributed across both Early Head Start and Preschool Head Start programs. Each kit included an age appropriate toothbrush, toothpaste, and dental floss in a clear plastic zipped tote bag for easy storage and safe keeping.

In addition, on October 13 and 14, STEP Head Start hosted the River Valley Mobile Dental Unit at the STEP Round Hills Campus in Williamsport. In total, 50 children were seen, and 12 children are scheduled for restorative dental care to address a total of 29 cavities.

STEP Head Start is dedicated to partnering with local resources and families to encourage the practice of good dental hygiene at a young age!







STEP Head Start hosted its first ever virtual Positive Behavior Interventions & Support (PBIS) Fall Harvest Kickoff Event from October 11 through 14!

The event is the yearly kickoff for the PBIS program, which teaches children about emotions and coping skills in order to proactively encourage good behavior. Many of the interactive activities, including deep breathing exercises and pumpkin feeling faces, help children to practice PBIS strategies. Caregivers are encouraged to carry PBIS into their homes through rewards and various tools.

Prior to the week-long event, each child received a bag of materials to successfully participate in hands-on activities during the virtual event. Items included a pumpkin from Tebb's Farm, playdough, stickers, an age appropriate book, and beehives for practicing PBIS skills.

Head Start families and staff had the opportunity to log into Zoom each evening from 4:00 PM until 5:00 PM to celebrate children and families, teach them more about PBIS, provide community resources and presenters, and facilitate interactive parent-child activities.

The Community Action Association of Pennsylvania (CAAP) Self-Sufficiency Awards and Annual Conference recognize the significant accomplishments of Self-Sufficiency Award winners while showcasing how Community Action Agencies support a person's journey toward financial stability. This year STEP, Inc. nominated two individuals, Angel Williamson-Irvin and Julian Thompson, who were recognized during the CAAP's virtual ceremony on November 4, 2021.

STEP Family Navigator Stacy Steppe (pictured left) nominated Angel Williamson-Irvin (pictured right) for the 2021 CAAP Progress Award for her work in the Youth Enrichment for Success (YES) Program. Angel has made tremendous progress and her future is bright!

Angel entered the Youth Enrichment for Success program on April 27, 2021 for the second time. She had temporarily relocated to Lycoming County in August 2020 but returned permanently a few months later. When she reached out to Stacy Steppe in April, a referral was made for high school equivalency classes with Penn State Career Pathways. Due to her work schedule, Angel completed the majority of her studies via online learning platforms. She also completed practice tests with Career Pathways staff.



Stacy worked with Angel to develop a goal plan. Angel has since obtained employment, maintained employment, and improved her overall health. She successfully passed all subjects of the HiSET on August 24, 2021 and earned her high school equivalency.

Angel continues to work on job readiness skills, budgeting and exploring educational options. She has expressed an interest in completing a Pennsylvania civil service exam to obtain a state job, as well as learning more about attending the police academy. STEP Family Navigator Megan Barckhoff (pictured below, left) nominated Julian Thompson (pictured below, right) for the 2021 CAAP Self-Sufficiency Progress Award for her success in the Work Ready Program. Julian has moved her family to self-sufficiency in a relatively short time due to hard work and initiative!

Julian entered the Work Ready Program at the very start of the pandemic in March 2020. She was a single mother fleeing domestic violence. Julian and her two children were living outside of the United States, in St. Thomas, with a partner who was destructive. Julian decided she and her children needed to move back in with her mother in Lycoming County.

When Julian entered the program, she was uncertain of almost everything and was overwhelmed with stabilizing things for her family. At the same time, she was facing a global pandemic that shut down school, daycares, and much of the stability that she was seeking.

As things started to reopen, Julian worked diligently on establishing a safe and secure life for her family. She was able to place both of her children in daycare in the summer of 2020. This offered her the freedom to address her needs while providing support and growth for her children. Julian also started to attend community service at Goodwill and enjoyed

In September of 2020, Julian obtained employment with Goodwill working 20 hours a week. Due to her employment status she was eligible for a Special Allowance for supportive services from the County Assistance Office that assisted with a car purchase. Julian reported feeling more happy and secure than she had in years. During the past year, Julian has put in a lot of work to ensure that her children have the stability and supports they need. Julian has also worked to ensure that she has the supports she needs to cope with the past.


SEPTEMBER 11TH NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE AND REMEMBRANCE

September 11th was designated a National Day of Service by Congress in 2009 and is led by AmeriCorps, the federal agency for volunteerism and national service. AmeriCorps partners with 911Day.org, the nonprofit that, along with 9/11 families, began the 9/11 Day observance more than a decade ago, and engages hundreds of nonprofit groups, faith-based organizations, schools, and businesses nationwide.

AmeriCorps members throughout all 50 states mobilized their communities to participate in projects that included delivering meals, refurbishing schools and community centers, collecting food and clothing, and building homes. Members also recruited mentors, provided services for veterans and military families, and helped citizens improve their financial literacy skills. Despite the pandemic, communities found ways to serve safely on 9/11.

Locally, STEP AmeriCorps honored the victims and heroes of that day through hosting a Blood Drive for the American Red Cross for their 9/11 National Day of Service project. Our community has a critical need for blood. Every 2 seconds someone in America needs blood. Did you know that it only takes one hour of your time to give blood and your donation can save three lives? You're helping friends, families and neighbors, right here in our community!





None of us expect disaster. Who could have anticipated that we would have a world-wide pandemic that would shut the country down and limit resources? The same goes for natural disasters, emergency situations, and unexpected circumstances—they are normally not anticipated and catch us completely off guard. That's why it is so important to be prepared. Having a personalized safety plan can minimize unnecessary suffering as well as bring peace to your mind.

STEP AmeriCorps is helping older adults prepare for the unexpected by offering a free emergency preparedness program! Participants of STEP's Centers for Healthy Aging and Meals on Wheels program can receive a personalized preparedness tool filled with everything from a list of medications needed in an emergency, emergency contacts, contact information for doctors and local emergency personnel, and much more!

Individuals receive an on-the-phone training where a STEP AmeriCorps member guides them through the workbook, creating their personalized plan. Once complete, the plan is mailed directly to the participant's home, where they can keep it on hand for reference in an emergency situation.
